
What a plant needs to grow.

- Sensory tubs are wonderful for children to play with. They offer opportunities to explore sights, sounds, smells and textures, and promote lots of imaginary play and language development.
- There are three basic ingredients you need for a sensory tub


WHAT YOU NEED


- 1. The tub itself. You'll want something large enough to hold your materials, but shallow enough so your child can easily reach inside. For example under-the-bed storage box, which is just right.
- 2. A base material. For example rice, pasta or real compost for your tub.
- 3. Added extras. Little spades, rakes, and plant pots. These are great for scooping, pouring and filling. You could add vegetables you have in the house ie. Carrots, turnip etc

How to grow a plant?






Method


- 1. Fill half of the plant pot with soil
- 2. Sprinkle seeds on to the soil
- 3. Pour more soil over the seeds
- 4. Use watering can to dampen the seeds
- 5. Put your plant pot on the window sill for sunlight
- 6. Water your seeds regularly

Fruit and Vegetable Activity



- Eat Plant Parts
- Materials: household fruits and vegetables
- Tell your child that people eat plants! Eating plants helps us stay healthy.
- Together search your kitchen for edible plants. Look for different parts of plants, for example: carrots or onions for roots; broccoli tops for flowers; lettuce for leaves; beans or peas for seeds; celery for stems; and bananas for fruit.
- Then pick out some plant parts to share as a snack!

Some painting ideas-very good for fine motor skills




Paper Plate flowers- very good for their cutting skills




Apple Tree Activity Draw trees and put the correct number of apples on each tree

(hands over head)


(bring hands down slowly)

(slowly stand up)


